LETTER FROM CEO

2021 was the world's second year of the pandemic. It brought with it a surge of cases and a second nationwide lockdown imposed yet again, leading to economic and livelihood difficulties for communities across India. COVID impacted women economically and their safety and security; incidences of domestic violence increased.

Despite the added restrictions and problems following COVID-19, women's leaders emerged. Srugna saw perseverance in its women. They earned their income, supported their families, developed, and went all out to protect their communities during this period. Srugna distributed masks and rations to three lakh families during COVID, with women leaders at the forefront of the support lines.

The development of these women contributed to the growth and expansion of Srugna itself. Srugna introduced several new programs, including its Digital Literacy training and coaching of the Super Didi and HEAL projects. We expanded across geographical boundaries and spread across India to several recent locations.

Srugna's goal is always to promote gender equality. According to the UN India Business Forum, women in India make up only 29% of the labour force, down from 35% in 2004. More than half of the work done by women in India is unpaid, and almost all of it is informal and unprotected. Women are not well represented in most sectors, including business leaders. Srugna aims to remove this gap by seeking to impact 1 lakh women. It is an ambitious yet supremely humble goal.

In the coming years of the organisation, we will strive to create 100s women leaders, eventually developing healthier, more prosperous, confident, and aware communities.

The World Economic Forum's 2021

The Global Gender Gap Report found that “as the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic continues to be felt, closing the [global] gender gap has increased by a generation from **99.5 years to 135.6 years.**”



The COVID-19 pandemic has disproportionately impacted women, from reduced economic opportunities and decreased access to reproductive and maternal health care to an increased incidence of sexual exploitation and gender-based violence.

It is estimated that the pandemic and worsening inequality will push 198 million people into extreme poverty by 2022, reversing two decades of progress. Further, an estimated 100 million additional children have been driven into poverty – a 10% increase compared to pre-pandemic levels.

Women are more likely to work in the informal economy, particularly in domestic service — insecure positions that do not offer paid leave or the ability to work from home. In fact, women make up 80% of domestic workers, of which 72% of domestic workers have lost their jobs as a result of the pandemic.

245 MILLION

In the first year of the pandemic, women and girls aged 15 to 49 have been subjected to sexual and/or physical violence by an intimate partner.



By September 2021, women were 2.4 times more likely than men to report losing paid work in order to care for others, compared to 1.8 times more likely in March of 2020.

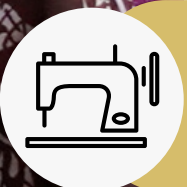

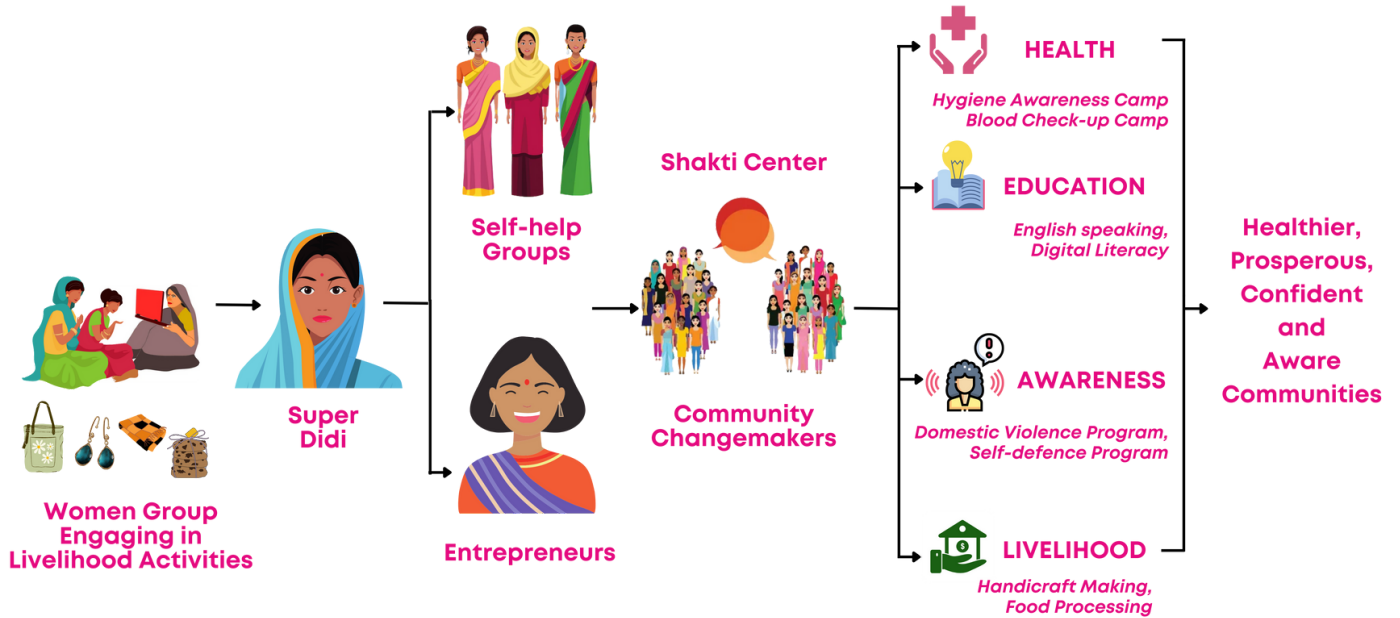
WOMEN GROUPS ENGAGING IN LIVELIHOOD ACTIVITIES

HEAL PROGRAM

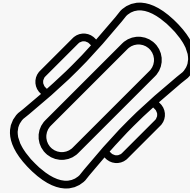

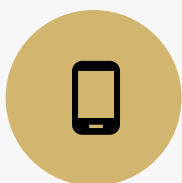

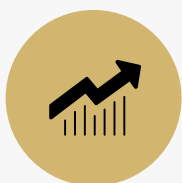

NEW LIVELIHOOD INITIATIVE SWAYAM-DRIVE PROJECT

Project Swayam, supported by the RPG Foundation, took off in November 2021 and will run until January 2022. Unlike any other projects, this project trained women in driving got them a driver's license, and finally, an earning opportunity as a two-wheeler delivery agent. In total, 30 women benefited from this.



Disha comes from a low-income community. Her husband makes idols during the festive season and her mother-in-law works as a maid. Being Having only passed her 12th grade, she did not have many work opportunities and hence she participated in the Swayam-drive project. She learnt to ride a two-wheeler, got a license, and got placed with Zomato. In two months, she earned INR 18,000-20,000/- and had a fabulous experience working with the company.

Srujna doesn't just help upskill women, but also provide them with channels to use those skills to earn a living. Through tie-ups with brands like Papa Don't Preach and Anita Dongre, and with exhibitions in companies like Yokohama, TU CIBIL and Diversey, women have received market exposure and generated income for themselves and their families.

THEY MADE IT

In 2011, Kamini Tare enrolled as a student in the tailoring course at Weworth group, Vasai. The group has been associated with Srujna since 2012. She only stitched simple bags and blouses for the past ten years and at the centre she used to assist others to complete the orders. She has got an opportunity to learn advanced tailoring offered by Srujna wherein she learnt to stitch bags, aprons, kurtis and so on. She has now become the centre head at Nalasopara and has begun teaching ten other coworkers. She enjoys teaching others and is now earning a living as a trainer.

Immediately after completing her 10th Shradha Lakeshri got married and shifted moved to Vasai, Palghar. *After her marriage, she joined one of our partnered groups for earning purposes, but had a desire to live a meaningful life. When the pandemic hit, most of the women were impacted economically and health wise, and so was Shradha!* During that time, instead of accepting failure, she decided to earn money by assisting the community. She started cooking healthy meals and serving the COVID affected families food at a very marginal rate. Seeing her enthusiasm and dedication, Srujna further helped her in up-skilling her entrepreneurship skills through training and development. She was also given market linkages for promoting her business.

Manisha is a widow from Sadar village in Murbad. Her husband died due to an accident. With many challenges in front of her such as educating her children, managing the household, she wanted to do something for her family. When she found out about the papad unit (Srujna group) in the village, she instantly joined. As it was in her own village, it saved her travel time. She was also able to devote her time to her children, focus on their education and manage her household. Due to this work, her savings increased and her income is INR 6000-7000/- per month.

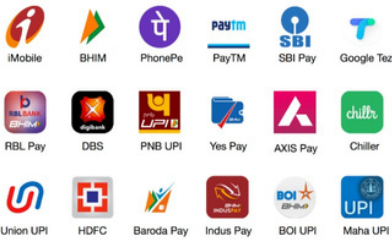
